There is no denying the impact of climate change on our seasons, perhaps the most obvious being the unexpectedly dry summer and warmer than normal winter. We have a pond on our property, in rural Bryan, and I have noted that in the 15 years I've lived here the pond has never been lower than it is this summer. Our lawn is already like straw. It's amazing that the crops in the fields are thriving as well as they are - evidence of hybridization of seed and miraculous creativity of God. Without diligent watering of gardens there would be limited harvest.



WISE WORDS

Can you name the season we are in for the church year? Each Sunday in our church bulletins, it reminds us this is the _____ Sunday after Pentecost. But this time of year is also called the Ordinary Season. Which name do you prefer?

Doesn't it seem strange that Easter is a season of 50 days, Christmas of 12 and Pentecost, celebrating the birth of the church only gets one day? But the Ordinary or After Pentecost season goes on for weeks on the liturgical calendar from now until the beginning of Advent.

Ordinary time sounds so drab, doesn't it? However, it helps to realize that "Ordinary" does not mean boring or mundane. The origin of the name Ordinary Time comes from the Latin word ordinalis, which means "numbered." This is the season that is not named for a major feast. The weeks are numbered instead. It is meant to be the season when we are God's people focus on our work out into the world. This is the time for mission, for compassion, for caring and sharing. This is the season when we show ourselves as the people of God with the values of peace and justice and love that are the hallmark of God's kingdom.

In our churches in Ordinary Time, we hear stories about how Jesus lived out his mission on earth. During this season the emphasis is also on how we are called to live out the Gospel while on earth. How do we live as Christ one day at a time, not only in the notable experiences of life, but also in the mundane?

Ordinary time provides a perfect canvas on which to portray how God works through us in daily life in our families, our work, our relationships with our neighbors, in our communities, and in the world, in our care for creation, in our recreation and leisure activities.

Listen to the Bible readings and consider how you can follow Jesus more deeply in this ordinary time of year. Pay attention to discover God in all things. Ask God what area of your spiritual walk needs nourishment. Let's make the Ordinary season, a time of growth, life, and renewal and become extraordinary messengers of the Gospel, even in the ordinary times of life.

My prayer this season is

to see God in the bubbles of the dish water,

to feel his presence in the cold dirt as I weed.

to spend time with him on partly cloudy, average temperature days,

to marvel at his creativity in the ant, ladybug, and fly buzzing in my house,

to be grateful for the aroma of coffee and the taste of fresh peaches,

to savor the smiles of friends and the giggles of grandchildren,

to play hide and seek with a joy filled God, peeking out in the spaces of the day.



WORSHIP FOCUS SEPTEMBER

Sept 3 Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost
The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his
suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart.
When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering,
Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing
them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he
urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with
evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might
offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

Sept 9 & 10 Fifteenth Weekend after Pentecost Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

Sept 16 & 17 Sixteenth Weekend after Pentecost In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism to be signs of reconciliation in the world.

Sept 23 & 24 Seventeenth Weekend after Pentecost Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.
