Pilgrimage Ponderings

By the time you read this we will have crossed the threshold into summer. With temperatures climbing, baseball season in full gear, vacations underway, and patriotic holidays ahead. Summer is many folks' favorite season because of the longer days, warmer temperatures, and more flexibility in schedules. It can be a season to re-set and decompress before the hectic resuming of school and structured activities.

The synod memory verse helps us in that re-set and decompress process. "So then, as sabbath rest remains for the people of God;" Hebrews 4:9. How are you doing with that sabbath rest? Though we traditionally observe our "sabbath" on Sunday, it's sometimes necessary to reconsider that practice and observe sabbath when it best fits your schedule.

My sabbath is, with few exceptions, Friday each week. Summer time Fridays are leisurely spent reading, longer walks in the park at a slower pace with our dog, a bike ride with Jeff and an evening bonfire while listening to a ball game. For me, that's a perfect sabbath - it restores me to be outside, to read for pleasure, to move my body, to choose companionship. I hope that practice honors the sabbath as the gift God intends it to be for my needs. You probably noticed that in my recounting of sabbath activities I didn't mention worshipping or prayer...it's not an oversight, but rather an essential part of those activities.


Worship of God, for me, is like breathing when I am outside. Prayer, for me, is any thought turned heavenward - a thought of gratitude for the free time and companionship, a thought of concern for the friend who is struggling, a remembrance of God's promise of the new day in the sunrise and God's protection through the night as the sunsets. Formal worship and prayer might be part of sabbath practice, but they don't always restore me vocational hazard, perhaps. Nature restores me. Unstructured time restores me. God provides sabbath for the needs of creation. God does not conform creation to fit a standard sabbath practice.

This summer our parish youth will experience various "sabbath" adventures by which they will be invited to re-set and reconsider how God invites them into a restored relationship, with the Divine and creation and community. Youth who attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans will be afforded wonderful opportunities for dynamic congregate worship and life changing outreach and relationship building...those are sabbath experiences. Youth who attend church camp will experience the re-set of meeting God in nature, worshiping in an outdoor cathedral shaped of trees with sun-filtered light streaming through leaves like stained glass windows. They will explore God's word in activities which bring the Biblical story to life. I look forward to hearing the stories of each of those groups of young people - and I look forward to hearing how your sabbath practice may have changed for your well-being this summer.

Sabbath - define it in a manner which benefits you as God's beloved and be blessed. Peace be with you, always!

Perhaps reading or listening to a new book. Maybe a type of genre you normally don't read or a topic you know little about. I usually stick to nonfiction but recently read Kristin Hannah's fiction book

called The Women. It was great.

Getting outside in nature or in our gardens is another welcoming practice. I love my time with God while on the backyard swing, listening to the birds in their morning chorus and checking out the changing colors in my flowers. WORSHIP FOCUS FOR JUNE

June 1 & 2 Second Weekend after Pentecost

Deuteronomy makes clear that sabbath-keeping is meant for the welfare of all. God delivered the Israelites out of slavery, so they should observe this freedom with a day of rest. No one should work seven days a week; even slaves and foreigners should be able to rest. Yet human beings can turn even the most liberating religious practice into a life-destroying rule. Jesus does not reject sabbath-keeping, but defends its original life-enhancing meaning. Our worship and our religious way of life are to lead to restoration: the hungry being fed and the sick being healed.

June 8 & 9 Third Weekend after Pentecost

A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus makes this observation in light of charges that he is possessed. He is possessed, not by a demon, but by the Holy Spirit. We who have received the Holy Spirit through baptism have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection and knit together in the body of Christ. Those with whom we sing and pray this day are Jesus' family. With them we go forth in peace to do the will of God.

June 15 & 16 Fourth Weekend after Pentecost

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

June 22 & 23 Fifth Weekend after Pentecost

Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation! Now we are in the storm, the boat almost swamped; but Jesus is here now, and when we call him, he will calm the storm. Even the wind and waves listen to him as they would to their creator. We also listen to him and are called to believe in the power of God's word in him, a power greater than all that we fear.

June 29 & 30 Sixth Weekend after Pentecost

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.

WORSHIP FOCUS FOR JULY

July 6 & 7 Seventh Sunday after Pentecost Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

July 13 & 14 Eighth Weekend after Pentecost When Amos reports his vision of God judging Israel for its mistreatment of the poor, he becomes a threat to the power of the priests and the king. John the Baptist also speaks truth to power, and Herod has him killed. In Herod's fear that Jesus is John returned from the dead, we may hear hope for the oppressed: all the prophets killed through the ages are alive in Jesus. We are called to witness to justice in company with them, and to proclaim God's saving love.

July 20 & 21 Ninth Weekend after Pentecost Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

July 27 & 28 Tenth Weekend after Pentecost Today is the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.
